
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

















• In the refrains ('O Jesu'), the choir is divided into two groups (①+②), in alternation along a row (so each singer sings the other part from his/her neighbours).

Each singer picks a starting pitch in the range $\frac{2^{\frac{1}{100}} + \frac{1}{100}}{\frac{1}{100} + \frac{1}{100}}$ and moves either up or down as little as a semitone or as

much as a major third, in the directions indicated by the arrows ($\uparrow \downarrow$) on the word 'Jesu'. 'N' indicates that the singer can choose a new starting pitch for the new phrase.

All chromatic pitches are available; the pitches should not be prepared in advance. Care should be taken not to sing in the cracks between chromatic steps.

• The verses ('Facta splendent inconcinna') should be sung by soloists. The 1st tenor may opt not to sing in the refrains if desired.
